



History of Raidighi College



On May 16th, 1995 at the initiative of some sincere and selfless local people and under the guidance of a number of enthusiasts, Raidighi College started functioning. Time has flown fast and Raidighi College has stepped into its twenty years.

The college is now on the fast track of the progress and success, on the threshold of a rapid expansion of infrastructure. Yet, there are many miles to tread before the dream becomes a reality, before the vision metamorphorises into action.

Raidighi College is located in an area which is socio-economically backward. Natural calamities are part and parcel of the people of this locality; students who come to pursue their higher studies are very poor. They sometimes fail to pay the minimum fees of the college. For the development of infrastructure we always look forward the grants allocated by the different Government agencies. College is in urgently in need to develop some infrastructure which is mostly for the welfare of our students.

It needs to be mentioned here that with the help of grants from U.G.C. and Sunderban Development Board construction work of girls' hostel is on the verge of completion. In the near future, we also wish to construct a similar hostel for boys. These hostels, we are confident, will immediately benefit those students who come to the college from far off areas and are therefore, inconvenienced by the hazards of having to commute long distances to and from the college. Among our future plans is also the construction of an auditorium with adequate seating capacity and all modern facilities. We also give UGC - sponsored remedial coaching classes and coaching classes, different competitive examinations for entry into services for weaker section of ST. SC and OBC students. We also intend to set up a modern

computer training centre in the college itself, which will enable not only the students of the college but the students and eager people of the entire Sundarbans area to receive training in computers and thereby discover new and fresh means to earn their livelihood. We have started a Study Centre of Rabindra Bharati University, which will enable the students of sundarbans to receive degrees in various post-graduate courses.

The Institute considers social awareness among the students is one of the important aspects to make them a good citizen. NSS's two units in the college have been paving the way in this direction. Volunteers of the NSS units have been doing a lot of works for the upliftment of social awareness among the people of this lineage part of Sundarbans. Health and nutrition oriented programmes and other STDS have been organized. Blood Donation Camp is one of its regular activities. Repairing of roads in the local areas, cleaning of hospital premises, illiteracy eradication programme etc. has been made mandatory for our volunteers.

Our institute believes in overall development of our students-both mental and physical growth. We encourage our students to participate in different sports events both in university level and society level. Our football and kabadi teams (both Boys and girls) are performing excellently and consistently. Our players were selected to play at national level. Students are enthusiastic to participate in other games and sports also. But inadequacy of fund and infrastructure they are not getting optimum opportunity to show their talent

Our students also participate in different cultural competitions. Students of Political Science Department are participating in Youth Parliament and quiz contest every year. They are to be appreciated in this regard. Even living in this remote part of the state, they are capable to win prizes for the college. In near future we are planning to have audio visual classes to train them.

Students of this institution are of first generation learner. They possess little knowledge about cocurricular and extra- curricular activities. Still we have been trying hard to make them aware of other activities of the department. We have been providing them opportunity to write down their own thoughts and imaginations. Wall magazines are the perfect. Example of their creative writing. Already Geography Department has been able to publish 5th editions of its departmental journal 'Revolution' (Porikromon). English Department is on the track to publish its 4th edition of its journal' Critique' within a very short period. Other departments are thinking on the same way. A few editions of departmental wall magazine have already been published. Departmental seminars are also very encouraging in our college. Students are getting ready how to deliver lecture. Departmental get-together and educational tour are normal aspect.

Though we do not have experienced any inter-departmental competitions, but it has been found





From the Desk of Principal

Raidighi College, situated by the largest mangrove of the world, strives continually towards enlightening the inhabitants of this remote, rural landscape – with the dream of spreading higher education among the needy enthusiasts belonging to the Schedule caste and tribes, mostly. A view into their daily choirs would place the matter in a more appropriate perspective. Raidighi is surrounded by a number of rivers, river-inlets and dense vegetation of the Sunderbans that nurture a large number of floras and faunas, the most beautiful and the fiercest of them being the Royal Bengal tiger, obviously. Hence, inhabiting for almost hundred years now, the people of this land live perpetually on a trapeze, with life and death on either side. 90% of the total population live below the poverty line, and they often have to put their lives at stake to secure a living – be it by fishing, or by collecting honey or by cultivating crops in these hostile, muddy lands. Despite being only 100km. away from the Eastern metropolis Kolkata, due to a weak conveyance, it has not been easy for Raidighi to get a sustained taste of the urban lifestyle and culture. Yet, it must be acknowledged that Raidighi throbs with its own unique dialect, philosophy and folk idiom.

Amidst all these hardships and poverty, the prospect of higher education is but a fanciful luxury for them, evidently, and it is here that the greatest challenge for the Raidighi College authority lies – in making the young educates realize the value of higher education as a remedy to the question of poverty. There has not been much attempt made in the fields of large, medium or small scale industries, to address the growing economic crisis. But even with such hostilities around, the college has managed to provide the basic, necessary infrastructural facilities to the students, and is striving for further developments, on the grants of the state government, the UGC and the local bodies. Not only higher education, but also a higher standard of imparting knowledge is a goal that the college tries to achieve. It is affiliated to Rabindra Bharati University, and has managed to start a centre for distance education – certainly a step towards its mission. Those who could not complete their studies years back, or could not be a part of the


regular courses offered by the college, are now getting benefited by the distance education mode. We have also planned to execute a number of career-oriented courses, and have taken the initiative towards organizing career- counseling, campusing, and other means for creating job opportunities for the students. The NSS units of the college have taken us closer to the local community by arranging massawareness campaigns and social-welfare programmes on issues of varied interest and importance. To keep the students healthy and physically sound, the college offers to them a low-budget gym, with basic amenities for exercise and body-building. Annually, a sports competition is organized on the adjacent field, and many indoor games are also held. Attempts are also being made to procure resources and infrastructural facilities for further modernization of the library.

The college encourages a warm and cordial relationship among the teachers and staffs, as well as between the teachers and the students. Organizing seminars, workshops, educational tours and picnics at a regular basis has made Raidighi College a place for exchanging ideas, thus, opening up new horizons. The college helps, in whatever ways it can afford, the poor farmers and their families every monsoon, in this flood-infested lowland which was once bruised by Aila – the devastating cyclone.

Water, woods and unique way of life – these are the things that define Raidighi, even amidst the technological boom of the twenty-first century. And as far as the question of higher education is concerned, back in the city, we endorse it; here, they still confront it. Hence, obstacles are many for Raidighi College; but we believe, even more is the possibility of a better outcome. We strive only for that.

Objectives


"Transforming Students to Ideal Countrymen"

Challenges:


□ First -generation learners and girls from disadvantaged sections need to be motivated to overcome social barriers and complete their education



The students are to be informed about the modalities of internal assessment well in advance.

1.1. The 3 year B.A. /B.Sc. / B.Mus. (Honours and General) Course of Studies under CBCS shall consist of Six
(6) Semester-I, Semester-II, Semester-III, Semester-IV, Semester-V and Semester-VI).

1.1.1. End Semester Examinations are to be held ordinarily at the end of the concerned Semester, i.e., Semester-I, Semester-III, Semester-V in **December-January** and Semester-II, Semester-IV, Semester-VI in **June-July**.

1.1.2. End Semester Examinations will be held for 80% of the total marks in each paper and Internal Assessment shall be for 20% of the total marks of each paper/subject/module. 50% of the total marks assigned to Internal Assessment (i.e., 10 marks for a full paper of 100 or 5 marks for a Module of 50, as the case may be) will be assessed on the basis of Internal Examination and remaining 50% will be assessed based on the class attendance (6 marks for attending 60% or above but less than 75% of the number of lectures delivered; 8 marks for attending 75% or above but less than 90% of the number of lectures delivered; and 10 marks for attending 90% or above of lectures delivered and such attendance will be calculated from the date of commencement of classes or date of admission whichever is later).

1.3. Question papers shall be set in English version only for the Honours papers of the following subjects

Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Botany, Zoology, Microbiology, Food & Nutrition and Geography.

1.4. Medium of Answer

For examinations in subjects other than language-based ones candidates shall have the option of writing their answers in either Bengali or English unless instructed otherwise in respective question paper(s). For examinations in languagebased subjects (e.g., Bengali, Hindi, Urdu, English etc.) candidates shall have to write their answers in the respective language only.

1.5. An Examination shall be held always under the current syllabus

2. First semester classes for B.A. /B.Sc. / B.Mus. courses of studies shall commence ordinarily within thirty days from the date of publication of results of the H.S. Examination of the year conducted by the West Bengal Council of Higher Secondary Education. Classes for second semester to sixth semester shall commence ordinarily within seven days from the date of completion of lower semester examination of the year respectively (e.g. class of 2nd semester shall commence within seven days from the completion of 1st semester examination).

3. An affiliated College/Institution shall submit application forms in prescribed format duly filled in

by the candidates intending to appear at the said examination(s) to the Controller of Examinations within the last date fixed by the University. Admit Card for an examination shall not be issued to the college concerned in favour of a candidate unless his/her application is duly filled-up in all respects and particularly in regard to : i) date of admission to the first semester class with current subject combination, ii) year of first appearance in the examination of the semester concerned and iii) year(s) of appearance (s) in the semester-I/semester-II/ and semester -III / semester-IV/ semester - V/ semester-VI Examinations as the case may be together with the results thereof and such other information as may be required from time to time and duly endorsed by the Principal testifying his/her a) good conduct, b) requisite attendance record in theoretical and practical/tutorial classes in each of the subjects in which he/she intends to appear and c)eligibility under this regulations for appearance at the concerned examination and in the said subject(s).

3.1. A candidate pursuing **Honours Course of Study** has to secure 30% marks (excluding the marks in Internal Assessment) separately in Theory and Practical/Tutorial part of each paper, wherever applicable, at the End Semester



Examinations, and a minimum of 30% marks in each paper (including marks in Internal Assessment) in order to earn the corresponding credit of the concerned paper and a minimum of CGPA 4.000 (including Internal Assessment) taking all the papers of all the Semesters as a whole, i.e., all **CC**, **DSE**, **SEC**, **GE** & **AECC** papers, in order to get the Honours Degree.

3.2. If a candidate pursuing **Honours Course of Study** secures 30% marks (excluding the marks in Internal Assessment) separately in Theory and Practical/Tutorial part of each paper, wherever applicable, at the End Semester Examinations, and a minimum of 30% marks in each paper (including Internal Assessment), but fails to secure a minimum of CGPA 4.000 (including Internal Assessment) taking all the papers of all the Semesters as a whole, i.e., all **CC, DSE, SEC, GE & AECC** papers, will get the General Degree. However, such candidate may re-appear at the 5th End Semester Examinations or 6th End Semester Examinations or both, when such examinations will be held next, within the stipulated period of five years in order to get a minimum of CGPA 4.000 and get the Honours Degree. In case, such examinee fails to obtain a minimum of CGPA 4.000, the previous status based on previous aggregate will be retained and such candidate will not be declared as having obtained General Degree again.

2.3. A candidate pursuing **General Course of Study** has to secure 30% marks (excluding the marks in Internal Assessment) separately in Theory and Practical/Tutorial part of each paper, wherever applicable, at the End Semester Examinations and a minimum of 30% marks in each paper (including marks in Internal Assessment) in order to earn the corresponding credit of the concerned paper and to get the General Degree.

2.4. A candidate who is eligible to appear at any of the End Semester Examinations does not enroll or does not appear at the examinations or fails to secure pass marks in the paper(s) at the concerned examinations, as stated in **Clauses 2.1**, **2.2**, **2.3** above, as well as a candidate not eligible to appear at the end semester examination, as stated in **Clause 6**, will be allowed to attend the classes in the next higher semester, as applicable.

2.5. Internal Assessment has to be done in the semester in which a candidate becomes eligible to appear in the concerned End Semester Examination. The candidates remaining absent in the internal examination will be awarded zero (0) marks. Marks obtained in Internal Assessment (i.e., marks for attendance and marks of internal examination taken together) shall be retained for the entire duration of his/her enrolment.

2.6. If a candidate secures pass marks in Practical Paper(s)/ Module(s)/ Project Work/ Tutorial but fails to secure pass marks in Theoretical paper(s)/ module, the marks of Practical Paper(s)/ Module(s)/ Project Work/ Tutorial along with Internal Assessment shall be retained.

2.7. A candidate may appear at any higher End Semester Examination without appearing at lower End Semester Examinations subject to Clause 6.

2.8. A candidate may continue his/her course of study for the next higher Semester without appearing at the lower End Semester Examinations subject to **Clause 6.**

2.9. A candidate who fails to secure pass marks (as stated in **Clauses 2.1, 2.2 and 2.3** above) in one or more papers of a semester may appear in those paper(s) when the concerned End Semester Examinations will be held next.

3. Re-examination/Review

i. Re-Examination/review is applicable only for Theoretical papers of different End Semester Examinations of 3 year B.A./B.Sc./B.Mus. Course of Studies. Re-examination/ review is not permissible for Internal Assessment, Practical & Tutorial Examinations and Project Work.

ii. A candidate will be eligible to re-examine/review his/her script if he/she appears at the concerned Semester examination as a whole.

iii. A student shall be allowed to apply for re-examination/ review of not more than 2(two) Theoretical papers/modules in each semester i.e. **CC**, **DSE**, **SEC** and **GE** for Honours Courses and **CC**, **DSE**, **SEC** and **GE** (wherever applicable) for General Courses, taken together, provided that he/she has scored qualifying marks, i.e., 30% in the remaining papers of that Semester.



iv. In re-examination of papers for any End Semester Examinations of 3 year B.A./B.Sc./B.Mus. Courses, then marks awarded by the re-examiner in a paper will be taken as the marks obtained by the candidate in that paper. If on re-examination/review of a paper, the marks get enhanced by more than 15% or get reduced by more than by 5% than that awarded by the original examiner (the percentage is to be calculated on the basis of the full marks in that paper), the script of the paper shall be referred to a third examiner. Among the marks awarded by three examiners, i.e., original examiner, second examiner (re-examiner) and the third examiner, the average of the two closer marks obtained will be awarded, provided that such a final award does not result in lowering of the **grade point** obtained by the candidate prior to re-examination/review in which cases the original award be retained.

4. Cancellation of Examination

Candidate may apply through the Principal for cancellation of enrollment of the concerned end semester examination within fifteen working days from the date of completion of theory papers of the said examinations. Such option for cancellation of examination once exercised cannot be revoked.

5. Grace Marks

A candidate who fails to obtain pass mark (in terms of Clauses 2.1, 2.2, 2.3) in any paper(s) in any semester for shortage of one mark shall be awarded one grace mark in such paper(s).

6. Degree

i) If a candidate pursuing Honours Course of Study clears all the papers and secures a minimum of CGPA 4.000 will be declared as obtaining B.A./B.Sc./B.Mus. (Honours) Degree with his/her CGPA and corresponding Letter Grade (C+, B, B+, A, A+ or A++).

ii) If a candidate pursuing Honours Course of Study clears all the papers and secures a minimum of

CGPA 3.000 but less than 4.000 will be declared as obtaining B.A./B.Sc./B.Mus (General) Degree with his/her CGPA and corresponding Letter Grade (C).

iii) If a candidate pursuing General Course of Study clears all the papers and secures a minimum of

CGPA 3.000 will be declared as obtaining B.A./B.Sc./B.Mus (General) Degree with his/her CGPA and corresponding Letter Grade(C, C+, B, B+, A, A+ or A++).

iv) A candidate, after successful completion of a three-year degree course B.A. / B.Sc. /B.Mus. (Honours/General) shall not be entitled to seek admission in any of the said courses of this University.

24. Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)

A 10-point grading system shall be followed for the purpose of Grade Point Calculation, as shown below.

i) Numerical Grade Point shall not be calculated in respect of a failed paper

ii) The multiplicative factors shall be 0.10 for all Grades for the purpose of calculating numerical Grade Point.

Example:

If the student secures P%, where $P \ge 30$ his/her grade point will be [3.0 + {(P - 30) × 0.1}] or simply 30 × 0.10 = 3

If a student scores 52% in a particular paper, his/her grade point for the paper will be

 $(3.00 + 0.1 \times 22) = 5.20$ or simply, $52 \times 0.10 = 5.2$

6(a) Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA)

The Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) will be the weighted average of the numerical grade points obtained in all the papers of the given semester, where Weights refer to the Credits assigned to the concerned papers. If the Numerical Grade Points obtained by a student in different papers of a Semester are denoted by Pi and the credit of the corresponding papers are denoted by Ci , the SGPA will be $[\Sigma(Pi \times Ci)/\SigmaCi]$ where i=1 to n, and n= no. of papers in the Semester. The SGPA shall be shown in the mark sheet up to the third decimal point.

6(b) Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)

Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) over six semesters shall be the weighted average of the six SGPAs. CGPA =(Σ (SGPAj × Cj) / Σ Cj) where j = 1 to 6. CGPA shall be calculated and shown up to three decimal places. SGPAj is the SGPA of the jth Semester (j=1 to 6) and Cj is the total credit of jth

Semester used for Grade Point Calculation. The grade of the candidate on the basis of CGPA will be as follows:

Both SGPA and CGPA will be rounded off to the third place of the decimal and will be shown as such on the grade sheet. The grade sheet issued at the end of each semester shall include the total marks obtained in each paper / module as well as the SGPA, the total marks obtained in that semester and the credit earned in the semester concerned. The final grade sheet, on completion of six semesters, shall include the SGPA of six semesters, CGPA, Letter Grade, the marks obtained, total marks and the total Credits earned.

7. Outline of Choice Based Credit System



A) Core Course (CC): A course, which should compulsorily be studied by a candidate as a core requirement is termed as a Core course.

□ Modalities of selecting CC by a student of Honours/ General programme shall be as follows:

a) In case of B.A./B.Sc/B.Mus. Honours programme a student shall have to study 14 Core courses of the Honours Subject as specified for each of the 6 semesters.

b) In case of B.Sc. /B.Mus. General Programme a student shall have to study 4 Core Courses of each of the 3 chosen subjects as specified for each of the first 4 Semesters.

c) In case of B.A. General programme a student shall have to study 4 Core Courses of each of the 2 chosen subjects as specified for each of the first 4 Semesters. In addition 4 Core Courses to be studied; two courses each from two language subjects: LCC1- English & LCC2- MIL (Bengali/Hindi/Urdu)/Alternative English as specified for each of the last 4 semesters.

B) Elective Course: Generally a course which can be chosen from a pool of courses and which may be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables an exposure to some other discipline/subject/domain or nurtures the candidate's proficiency/skill is called an Elective Course.

i) Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) Course: Elective courses which may be offered by the main discipline/subject of study is referred to as Discipline Specific Elective. This course is to advance knowledge and skill in the core course domain.

□ Modalities of selecting DSE by a student of Honours/ General programme shall be as follows :

a) In case of B.A./B.Sc./B.Mus. Honours programme a student shall have to study 4 DSE courses strictly on the Honours subject. Such a student shall have to study the curriculum of DSE on the Honours subject concerned as specified for the relevant semester.

Explanation: Each Honours subject shall have two groups (A & B) of DSE papers. A student shall choose any one paper from each of Group A and Group B in fifth semester and sixth semester.

b) In case of B.A. General programme, a student shall have to study 4 DSE courses strictly on 2 subjects, opted for pursuing Core Courses, taking exactly 2 courses from each subject. Such a student shall have to study the curriculum of DSE of the subject concerned as specified for the relevant semester, i.e., DSE-A in the 5th and DSE-B in 6th semester.

Explanation : Each General subject shall have two groups (A & B) of DSE papers. A student shall have to choose one paper from Group A of each of the two subjects in the fifth semester and one paper from Group B of each of the two subjects in the sixth semester.

c) In case of B.Sc./B.Mus. General programme, a student shall have to study 6 DSE courses strictly on 3 subjects, opted for pursuing core courses, taking exactly two courses from each subject. Such a student shall have to study the curriculum of DSE of the subject concerned as specified for the relevant semester, i.e., DSE-A in the 5th and DSE-B in 6h semester.

Explanation: Each General subject shall have two groups (A & B) of DSE papers. A student shall have to choose one paper from Group A of each of the three subjects in fifth semester and one paper from Group B of each of the three subjects in sixth semester.

Dissertation/Project: An elective course designed to acquire special/advanced knowledge, is termed as dissertation/ project. This is considered as a special course involving application of knowledge in solving/ analyzing/ exploring a real life situation/ difficult problem. A dissertation/ project work will be of 6 credits. A dissertation/ project work may be given in lieu of a Discipline Specific Elective.



ii) **Generic Elective (GE) Course :** An elective course chosen generally from an unrelated discipline/subject, with an intention to seek wide exposure, is called Generic Elective.

□ Modalities of selecting GE by a student of Honours/ General programme shall be as follows :

a) In case of B.A./B.Sc./B.Mus. Honours programme, a student shall have to choose 4 Generic Elective papers strictly from 2 subjects of choice taking exactly two courses from each subject as specified for first 4 semesters.

b) In case of B.A. General programme, a student shall have to choose 2 Generic Elective papers strictly from one particular subject [which will be different from the core subjects including the Core Languages (LCC1 & LCC2)] as specified for the 1st and 2nd semester.

N.B.: A core course offered in a discipline/subject may be treated as an elective by other discipline/subject and such electives may also be referred to as Generic Elective. [A Core Course (CC) of B.A/B.Sc./B.Mus. General may be treated as Generic Elective for B.A./B.Sc./B.Mus. (Honours) and B.A. (General)].

C) Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) : The Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) may be of two kinds: Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC).

a) Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) : AECC courses are the courses based upon the content that leads to Knowledge enhancement. These are mandatory for all disciplines.
 i) AECC1: Communicative English / MIL (Bengali/Hindi/Urdu); ii) AECC2: Environmental Studies

i) AECC1: Communicative English / MIL (Bengali/Hindi/Urdu); ii) AECC2: Environmental Studies.

b) Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC): These courses may be chosen from a pool of courses designed to provide value-based and/or skill-based knowledge and are aimed at providing competencies, skills, etc.

□ Modalities of selecting SEC by a student of Honours/ General programme shall be as follows :

a) In case of B.A./B.Sc./B.Mus. Honours programme a student shall have to study 2 skill enhancement courses strictly on the Honours subjects. Such a student shall have to study the curriculum of SEC on the Honours subjects concerned as specified for the relevant semester, i.e., SEC-A in the 3_{rd} semester and SEC-B in the 4_{th} semester.

Explanation: Each Honours subject shall have two groups (A & B) of Skill Enhancing Course papers. An Honours student shall have to choose one paper from Group A in third semester and one paper from Group B in fourth semester.

b) In case of B.A. General programme, a student shall have to study 4 Skill Enhancement courses strictly on 2 subjects, opted for pursuing Core Courses, taking exactly 2 courses from each subject. Such a student shall have to study the curriculum of SEC of the subject concerned as specified for the relevant semester.

Explanation : Each General subject shall have two groups (A & B) of SEC papers. A student shall have to choose one paper from Group A of each of the two core subjects in the third and fifth semesters and one paper from Group B of each of the two core subjects in the fourth and the sixth semester.

c) In case of B.Sc/B.Mus. General programme, a student shall have to study 4 Skill Enhancement Courses strictly on 2 subjects out of the three, opted for pursuing core courses, taking exactly two courses from each subject. Such a student shall have to study the curriculum of SEC of the subject concerned as specified for the relevant semester.

Explanation : Each General subject shall have two groups (A & B) of SEC papers. One paper from Group A of each of the two Core subjects to be chosen in the third and fifth semester; one paper from Group B of each of the two core subjects to be chosen in the fourth and sixth semester.

□ **Practical/ Tutorial:** Every Core, Discipline Specific and Generic Elective Course shall have a Practical/ Tutorial component. Wherever there is a practical, there will be no Tutorial and vice-versa.



Admission will be done by the processes of online application, Merit list publication, Counseling, verification of the documents, Admission. Those candidates who will fail to produce the original mark sheets of the Higher Secondary examination of the West Bengal Council of Higher Secondary Education, or of any other equivalent examination and any other credentials, their candidature will be rejected without any clarification.

Additional Information

- ***** Two copies of Passport size photographs are required at the time of admission.
- At the time of admission, the original admit card and mark sheet of i.e. secondary (Madhyamik) and the Higher Secondary examinations, or of any other equivalent examinations, have to be produced.
- Photocopies of the same will have to be submitted to the college office.

The college library is housed in a big and spacious room on the ground floor. There is a reading room attached to the library. Students may borrow books from the library either for use in reading room or to take them home. For these purpose, two cards are issued to each student. If card is lost, a duplicate card will be issued on payment of Rs. 5/- It is mandatory for all students to submit these cards to the college before filling in application forms for B.A. / B.Sc. University Examinations. The college library has been computerized very shortly to facilitate smoother operation. Students are required to take note of the rules and regulations regarding the use of the college library that are listed on the board outside the library. They are instructed to follow these guidelines, and to co-operate with the librarian in all respects. **Total area of the Library:** 1350 sqft

Seating capacity: 60 Students can sit at a given time.

Working hours of the Library: On Week days: 10.30 a.m. to 5 p.m. On Saturdays: 10.30 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Layout of the library:-

Since the space in the library is inadequate to accommodate the large number of books, the college authority has decided, as of now, to provide 2 rooms in the AJC Bose Bhavan for keeping books and providing reading facilities, till new construction is done.

The library procures books, journals and study materials on the recommendations of the faculty members and demands of the students. A budget is prepared by the Library Committee as per the grant allocated for the purpose. 
Additional Information

Through annual meets between the parents and the teachers, the college expresses its concern for the students' progress or otherwise to their guardians. Apart from the formal annual meeting, the teachers of the respective departments may inform the guardians about their wards' performance if and when needed. The guardians provide the college constructive suggestions based on which the college initiates remedial measures for the betterment of the students of this backward area, many of whom are first generation learners.



Alumni Association

The college has a cordial relationship with its alumni. The college is only 21 years old now, and the alumni-strength is not great. Yet, even among only a handful of alumni, there are notable and successful ex-students who keep coming to the college out of their love and respect. Thus, at its twenty-first year, the college intends to organize the First Reunion centrally. However, there are individual departmental reunions organized by a few departments for now where the exstudents participate.

Women's Hostel:



The college has its own Women's Hostel, 'Nivedita Bhavan' which is going to accommodate its first batch of residents from this session 2018-2019. The hostel is situated just

opposite to the Main Building of the college, on the other side of the road. It has a capacity of 100 girl-students. The provision of the hostel will hopefully encourage the girl-students who come from far to accommodate themselves here and avoid the strenuous journey from home.

Teaching Aids:

In course of time, the college has developed itself to the use of several teaching aids for the students' benefits. Such aids include power point presentation through LCD projectors, audio-visual methods, film screening, debates, educational excursions, mock parliamentary sessions, special lectures and others.

Internet Accessibility

The college has uninterrupted internet accessibility. The teaching fraternity as well as the students can use internet services as per their academic necessity. The college has wi-fi accessibility too.

Water Purifier

Responding to the need for purification of drinking water, the college has installed Water Purifier. The teachers, staffs and the students get uninterrupted supply of purified drinking water.



Green Generator

The college, situated in a remote area, used to experience power-cuts and uneven power-supply for a long time. But installation of a Green Generator in the campus has solved the problem of electricity for the college. Now, even if there is a crisis of power or a problem of low voltage, the generator backs them up by generating a steady flow of electricity.

Rain Water Harvesting

Rain Water Harvesting is one key process of recycling natural resources, and the college, in its

endeavour to preserve and use rain water, has taken a sound step towards generating

environmental awareness.

Solar Energy Resource

The college is on its way to install a Solar Energy System. At a time when the use of alternative energy resources is becoming extremely crucial on both humanitarian and environmental grounds, the decision to use solar energy is definitely a positive step taken by the college.

Eco Club and Medicinal Plant Garden

Situated in an area with a rich stock of floras and faunas, the college has its own Eco-Club. The club keeps track of the bio-diversity of the area, and creates among the students and the teachers an environmental awareness. Besides, there is a medicinal plant garden in our campus, collecting and preserving rare/ regional species of medicinal plants.

Discipline in the College

Discipline is the most essential requirement for any kind of progress. Therefore, the college is always prepared to take any step that it deems fit in order to ensure that strict and proper discipline is maintained at all times in the college premises. In this respect, it may be mentioned that it is mandatory for students to follow certain rules and regulations:

- * Students will maintain silence in the college library and in the class room.
- * Students should not loiter unnecessarily or talk on the college corridors.
- The laboratory is meant only for serious academic work. Absolute silence needs to maintain outside the laboratory. Students should not loiter unnecessarily in the adjoining area.
- No indecent behavior, vulgar language, or activities, or disrupting the smooth functioning and academic atmosphere of the college, will be tolerated on the college premises.
- * The college campus should be kept clean at all times.



<u>Attendance</u>

According to the regulations of Calcutta University, each student will have to attend at least 75% of the classes held in each subject. If a student's attendance is below 75% but not below 60%, he/she may take the University examinations as a non-Collegiate candidate, subject entirely however, to the discretion of the college authorities. Students whose attendance is below 60% will not be allowed to take sit for the University examination at any cost.

Examination Regulation

- ✤ Regular class tests for Honours/General subjects will be held for 1st year, 2nd year and 3rd year students.
- ✤ Half yearly examination will be held for 1st year and 2nd year students.
- For Honours / Major candidates there will be preparatory examination of Part- I/II/III Examination and an Honours candidate is required to secure at least 35% in aggregate in class tests (30% in the theoretical and Practical portion separately, but 35% in aggregate in case of a subject having practical) in Honours subjects and so present himself/ herself at preparatory examination in order to be sent up for Part-I/II/III Examination.





Miscellaneous Information

- *Each student, while coming to the college, should carry the identity Card provided by the college.*
- If a student remains absent from the college for 15 consecutive days without any written information his or her name will be struck off the college rolls, and he or she may be refused subsequent admission to the college.
- ✤ In keeping with the University syllabus, the department of Geography, of the college organizes regular excursion and field tours, the expenses for which are borne by the students of the department.
- Poor but meritorious students are aided by the college in various ways on submission of proper evidence and appropriate documents.
- The guardian of each student should maintain regular contact with the principal and the departmental Teachers.
- Students should participate actively in the publication of the college magazine and the departmental magazines. The various department of the college also publish departmental newsletters, collections, seminar papers and seminar reports.








